Cardinal Innovations Year-End Report

Cardinal Innovations Healthcare has provided the County with its FY 14-15, 4th quarter performance report.

From July 1, 2014 to June 30, 2015 a total of 4,194 distinct mental health consumers were served. This is a decrease of 536 (11.3%) over the same time period last year. The overwhelming majority (N = 2,695, 64%) were served via outpatient treatment services.

Daymark and Monarch were the top two (2) providers with respect to numbers served. Meanwhile, Monarch and GHA were the top (2) providers with respect to paid claims.

Big Lick Sewer Transmission Line

Chambers Engineering provided an initial report that the operational performance of the line is satisfactory.

Chambers mentioned a couple items for future consideration. First, the line crosses two (2) fairly significant NC DOT drainage culverts. The County may want to consider re-locating the line around these culverts in the future to avoid potential damage.

Additionally, the line only has two (2) pressure release valves. Chambers thought there should be more valves given the line has a few high points. However, the line appears to be operating properly with just 2 valves at the current time.

Staff will work to draw up an asset acquisition agreement and evaluate all easements in an effort to secure part ownership of the line in the near future.


Agri-Civic Center Stage Facelift

Over the past several months the Agri-Civic Center staff had received several complaints about the condition of the stage at the Center. The stage is painted at least one time per year by the Uwharrie Players after their productions. The multiple layers of paint coupled with duct tape and other items that had accumulated on the stage floor over the past 20+ years led to a deteriorated surface.

In response, the Agri-Civic Center staff sought the assistance of a professional stage reconditioning contractor. The contractor was originally going to sand down the layers of paint, tape and other debris and simply re-paint the floor. However, once the floor was sanded (an estimated 25 coats of paint removed) it revealed a tongue and groove hardwood floor that was in very good condition.

As such, staff was reluctant to cover the hardwood floor with black stage paint. Staff consulted with the Friends of the Agri-Civic Center and they felt strongly the floor should be stained and coated with polyurethane. Further the Friends group agreed to fully cover the additional \$2,600 expense. Below please find the before and after photos of the stage rehabilitation.
