


Over the past year, the Board of Commissioners committed resources for multiple projects and services which include, but are not limited to, the list below:

- Expanded sewer capacity to increase the marketability of the Prime Power Park near the airport
- Designed a virtual speculative building to attract interest from new and/or expanding businesses
- Increased funding to support a locally grown foods and agri-business initiative
- Adopted a minimum housing ordinance to protect property values and enhance public safety
- Secured grant funds to remove unsightly abandoned mobile homes
- Obtained grants to expand the County's water system
- Increased funding for public safety vehicle replacement and facility maintenance
- Increased local funding to public schools; and
- Initiated several studies to help the County make informed decisions about the long-term cost benefit of additional water, sewer and fiber optic infrastructure as well as the replacement of an out-of-date public safety/emergency responder radio communications network.

The Board of Commissioners is focused on making wise investments to grow the local economy, increase the availability of job opportunities and reduce the cost of government.

On behalf of the Board of Commissioners and all of the staff, it is our honor and privilege to serve the residents of this county and share with you the accomplishments from the past year. Public Library & Museum

- Received the “Outstanding Service Innovation Project for Medium-Sized Libraries” award for the merger with the Stanly County Museum from the North Carolina Public Library Director’s Association.
- Stanly County Historical Society was formed and provides historical programs to the community.
- “The Civil War in NC” exhibit, a collection of photos from the North Carolina Department of Cultural resources, is now on exhibit and was provided by grant funding.
- Many of our archives are now part of the North Carolina Digital Heritage Center and are available at www.digitalNC.org.
- 700 ebooks are checked out monthly. Your free library card enables you to download ebooks to your e-reader; enjoy “anytime checkout” and no overdue fees with ebooks.
- “Bouncing Babies Storytime” and a new program for teens are offered twice per month.
- 120 students participated in the new winter reading program and read books to earn free tickets to the Ringling Brothers Barnum & Bailey Circus.

NC Cooperative Extension

Cooperative Extension programs address agriculture profitability and sustainability, safe and secure food and farm systems, family financial management skills, positive youth development and healthy eating, physical activity and chronic disease risk reduction.

- 11,384 participants were impacted by direct services, events and activities.
- 13,838 citizens were indirectly contacted by telephone calls, e-mails, newsletters, and direct mailings.
- Agents contributed 33 articles to area newspapers with a weekly circulation of 11,800.
- Informal educational opportunities for youth and adults were provided through 43 non-credit classes.
- Volunteers are an important part of Extension programming: 115 individuals volunteered 583 hours (\$11,806 value) and provided educational information to 1,656 citizens.

Agricultural producers were provided programs to assist with increasing profitability and sustainability. \$199,082 of additional income was earned by producers as a result of implementing best management practices in their farming operations.

Programs offered in family financial management skills and positive youth development included:

- 574 citizens received education related to Medicare insurance products resulting in an estimated savings of \$367,400.
- 4-H Embryology Program for 2nd graders resulted in 312 students increasing interest and skills in science.
- Ag Awareness Days provided 708 students an opportunity to increase knowledge about agriculture. Teachers reported improvements in their students’ interest in science, animals, plants, crops, and the source of their food and clothing.
- The Steps to Health Nutrition Education Program addresses healthy eating, physical activity and chronic disease risk reduction. Approximately 70 students participated in the program; 85% of the students improved their overall knowledge of nutrition with 48% reporting they made positive nutritional behavior changes as a result of the program.

There is continued improvement in the regional business climate. An increase in the number of existing companies in the midst of or planning expansions in Stanly County reflects this. Examples include: the expansion of New Finish Inc. in Norwood, Carolina Paper Converters in Oakboro, and the planned expansion of Tucker Engineering Associates in Badin. The EDC worked with over 50 new potential projects in various stages of the recruitment process over the course of last year.

Other Product and Business Development Activities:

- Continued efforts with economic development allies to enhance the attractiveness of the virtual speculative building in the Prime Power Park across from the Stanly County Airport. Park owner completed grading to establish a fully-graded building pad for a 200,000 square foot industrial building.
- Continued the process of identifying and developing additional sites served by infrastructure to expand the product offering available to prospective firms. The EDC's submission of the Brickyard Site in Norwood, NC was chosen for evaluation under Duke Energy's Site Readiness Program. One of the nation's leading site selection firms conducted a thorough review of the site's potential, including a "buildability" assessment by an experienced land use and site planning firm.
- The opportunity to obtain an expanded view of the county's economic development efforts from a highly regarded site selection and economic development consultant presented itself with help from the Duke Energy economic development team. A key aspect of this study centered on the delivery and coordination of infrastructure, utility and fiber optic connectivity. A follow-up telecommunications study is on-going to help identify additional sites served by fiber optics.
- Participated in a variety of Stanly County Chamber events, including the Business Expo, Membership Event, Board of Directors Retreat and staff participated in Leadership Stanly.
- Participated in Charlotte Regional Partnership sponsored trade mission targeting international firms interested in establishing US operations and in a trade show targeting firms in the energy sector.

Planning & Zoning


- Adopted an Ordinance establishing minimum housing standards and high grass to become effective January 1, 2013. The department is taking complaints at this time and will process them accordingly.
- Currently in negotiations with Cabarrus County to clarify the county line.
- The County continues to provide contracted service to the towns of Norwood and Badin to process zoning violations, public nuisance violations, and minimum housing code violations.

Utilities



Stanly County Utilities (SCU) is responsible for the distribution of more than 1 million gallons of drinking water each day. SCU operates as four water systems – Stanly County, Greater Badin Water & Sewer District, Piney Point Water District and Stanly Water & Sewer Authority. SCU also provides waste-water collection and treatment to over 700 customers in the Greater Badin district and collection of wastewater from northern part of Stanly County, the County Airport region, the Town of Red Cross, and the Palestine, Millingport, Ridgecrest and Aquadale communities. These services promote public health and sanitation in these communities.

ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION

Soil and Water Conservation Service

- Obligated 36 contracts for a total of \$536,398 for the installation or adoption of best management practices to address natural resource concerns on 6,076 acres of working land within Stanly County.
- Wrote conservation plans for 2,192 acres of working land to address soil health and water quality to help protect these valuable natural resources.
- Implemented 12 Comprehensive Nutrient Management Plans to ensure animal operations applied waste at agronomic rates to aid in crop growth requirements and forages for livestock.
- The District hosted a poster contest for 5th grade students, Essay Contest for 6th grade students and a Land Judging contest for high school students.
- The No-till Drill reseeded 283 acres of pasture for erosion control.
- 52 citizens purchased a total of 2,000 seedlings during the pine tree sale in February.

Solid Waste

ANNUAL HAZARDOUS WASTE RECYCLING EVENT

360 Stanly County households participated in the 15th annual Household Hazardous Waste Event held in April 2012. Citizens brought household materials to the recycling event in lieu of depositing them at the landfill. 27,208 lbs. of materials were collected, consisting of:

- 12,460 lbs. of paint
- 2,877 lbs. of paint related materials
- 250 lbs. of lead acid batteries
- 11,145 lbs. of electronics
- 476 lbs. of pesticides

Information Technology/GIS

Technology is a key component of all services and supports all operations of local government. The four (4) main projects undertaken by IT this past year focused on delivering government services more efficiently and effectively. The projects are listed below:

- **Health Department** – Electronic Medical Records System
The system is largely funded with grants and will enhance customer service, the efficiency of billing and the patient's overall experience.
- **Tax Administration** – Tax Appraisal and Collections Software Upgrade
The upgraded software will provide numerous new tools to enhance the productivity associated with forced, past due tax collections and overall tax office operations.

- **General Government** - Migration to a New Enterprise Resource Planning System
The migration will provide many internal improvements over the current system that is 23+ years old that will increase employee efficiency and productivity. Additionally the new system will enhance the customer's experience by making services such as on-line bill pay available for utility customers.
- **General Government** - Return on Investment Analysis for Email and File Storage Migration to the Cloud
Staff is exploring the costs and benefits associated with moving email and file storage to cloud based hosting. Locating service on the cloud has the potential to help the County realize significant cost savings and improve employee mobility which translates to increased productivity.

Register of Deeds

- Overall revenues increased by 9.6% and excise tax revenue increased by 13.2%.
- Foreclosures increased by 3.9%, while bankruptcies decreased by 25%.
- The office processed a total of 15,929 documents.
- Completed a four-year Preservation Project to stabilize and preserve deteriorating archives.
- Identity Theft: We continue to protect the personal identifying information of all citizens of Stanly County such as social security numbers, bank account numbers, driver's license numbers, military records and other vital data through state required security rules and regulations, education and public awareness.
- Amanda Cody completed the certification program through the North Carolina Register of Deeds Association and the North Carolina Institute of Government at Chapel Hill.



The Valentine's Day Wedding Event hosted by the office of the Register of Deeds brought more than 60 Stanly County businesses together to host a memorable wedding ceremony and reception. Local businesses provided flowers, cake, wedding gowns, dinners, punch fountain, hair stylist, and a horse drawn carriage ride valued at more than \$10,000. This was offered at no cost to the taxpayers.

Tax Administration

The Stanly County Tax Administration Office is comprised of the Assessor's and Collector's offices. The appraisal staff is finalizing the 2013 countywide reappraisal; these notices will be mailed in March. The purpose of the reappraisal is to equalize the tax burden among property owners. Approximately 37,700 parcels have been appraised. Informal appeals will be heard by staff appraisers (appointment required). The public may view, pay, and print receipts of their tax bills online.

Performance data:

- The percentage of total levy collected for FY11-12 was 95.16%.
- Through January approximately 305 building permits have been

processed by the Assessor's Office for 2012.

- The Land Records Division identified and processed 1,834 deeds, representing an overall increase of 14.7%.
- The Assessor's Office processed 1,522 Homestead and Veterans exemptions in 2012, resulting in an exclusion amount of \$55,830,141.

HUMAN SERVICES

Health Department

The 2012 "State of the County's Health Report" provides a review of various health and human service data to monitor the health status of Stanly County. Some of the top health concerns included: tobacco use/smoking, obesity, and illegal drug use. The complete report can be accessed online at <http://health.co.stanly.nc.us>

The department coordinated efforts with the Stanly County Partners In Health, a local Healthy Carolinians Taskforce, to address priority community health issues such as obesity, injury prevention, infant mortality, and tobacco prevention. Health promotion efforts also included coordinating the development of a worksite wellness program for County employees. The department began participation in a regional Community Transformation Program to mobilize efforts to implement policy, systems and environmental changes supporting tobacco-free living, active living, and healthy eating.

Services rendered:

- Clinical Services were provided to 4,914 people.
- The WIC Program (Women, Infants, & Children) served 7,606 women and children and had a caseload of 1,552.
- Dental Clinic: Children's dental clinic provided services through 5,680 clinic visits. Additionally, dental treatment was provided to 106 patients through the operating room.
- Home Health: The Stanly County Home Health Agency maintained an average monthly caseload of 111 patients and made 9,132 patient visits.
- Animal Control: handled 2,173 stray or unwanted pets. 100 animals were reclaimed by owners and 281 were adopted or placed in new homes. Special rabies clinics resulted in vaccinations of 616 dogs and 90 cats.
- Environmental Health: completed 1,078 Food & Lodging visits related to the inspection of food service, institution, daycare, and lodging facilities. Three food service manager courses were offered with a total of 83 participants. Three meetings were held on the new NC Food Code with a total of 161 participants. The department enrolled in the Voluntary FDA Standards Program in January and completed the self-assessment in December. Environmental Health made 952 site visits related to on-site wastewater and the private well water program and 284 water samples were collected.

Senior Services

Senior Services strives to enhance the quality of life for older adults in Stanly County by providing a range of services, programs, supports, and opportunities for adults 60 years old and older. The Senior Center became recertified as a NC Senior Center of Excellence, which identifies our Senior Center as having best practices in numerous areas such as staffing, programming, planning and outreach. The recertification status is good for five years.

- Offered over 100 activities, programs and trips including Tai Chi, Shagging and evidence based classes to address chronic disease, fall prevention, diabetes and tools for caregivers.
- Over 1,800 people visit monthly, averaging approximately 90 visitors per day.
- Approximately 100 individuals aged 90 years old or older celebrated at the "90 + Birthday Party". The two oldest guests in attendance were over 102 years old.
- Continued to be a partnering agency for the Uwharrie Senior Games and SilverArts (USG). USG joins adults 55+ in Stanly and Montgomery County through various fun and competitive events. Over 100 participants from the two counties joined USG in 2012.
- In-Home Aide Services and Family Caregiver Support Programs assisted 125 seniors and their families with 16,743 hours of direct assistance with home management, respite, and personal care. Participants receiving these services made voluntary contributions totaling \$11,493.
- Sponsored the 10th annual CareFest with 22 vendor agencies represented to share information about services in the county. A total of 125 participants attended.
- Provided 103 days of group respite through the CARE Café.
- Hosted the first annual GrandCare Recognition Luncheon in collaboration with the Stanly County Family YMCA, DSS and Second Parenthood Support Group. This event honored grandparents who are raising grandchildren. A total of 56 people attended.
- The nutrition program served approximately 21,067 congregate meals from the four sites in the county, 42,131 home delivered meals, and issued over 1,700 cases of supplemental nutrition drink such as Ensure Plus and Glucerna to eligible seniors. Participants receiving services through these programs contributed \$72,486 for the services.
- Information and Assistance Program (I&A) assisted 983 seniors or their family members last year finding resources and assistance for their particular needs.
- Stanly County Senior Services contracts with Stanly County Transportation (SCUSA) and provided 829 senior adults with transportation to medical appointments, nutrition sites and other errands.
- AARP Tax Aide volunteers helped over 300 citizens complete their income tax returns.

Social Services (DSS)

Services and programs administered by the Department of Social Services have eligibility guidelines. If you feel that you may qualify for certain programs or have questions about your eligibility, please contact our agency.

- Work First Employment Services assisted 23 families in becoming employed.
- Collected \$4,231,404 in Child Support Payments.
- There were 23 licensed foster families to care for our foster children.
- Had placement responsibility for 60 children who were in foster care.
- Provided \$2,344,371 to local daycare providers through the Child Day Care Subsidy Program.
- Assessed 615 reports of children reported to be abused, neglected or dependent.
- Issued 236 work permits to youth.
- Enrolled 962 children in the North Carolina Health Choice Program.
- Assisted 101 disabled adults to remain in their own homes as long as possible through the Community Alternative Program.
- Assisted 28 adults with In-Home Aide Services.
- Provided \$15,155,941 in Food Stamps to Stanly County recipients.
- Provided \$460,810 to county residents for heating or cooling assistance.
- Saw an average of 194 individuals visiting the agency each day.
- Provided medical assistance to an average of 9,683 individuals per month.

Veteran Services


This office assists veterans, dependants and surviving spouses with applications and forms required for Federal, State and County benefits through the Veterans Administration.

- Rod Barbee (Veterans Service Officer) completed all requirements to become a fully-accredited representative of the North Carolina Division of Veterans Affairs and The American Legion and is now legally authorized to present claims before the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs.
- The Veterans Office assisted over 4,100 Stanly County veterans, dependants and surviving spouses this year.
- Three students received full college scholarships from the North Carolina Division of Veterans Affairs at an approximate value of \$60,000 each. (\$180,000 total)
- Approximately \$325,000 was awarded to veterans and their families through this office as result of claims submitted.

Emergency Services

Stanly County Emergency Services is a tiered department; including Emergency Management, Emergency Medical Service (EMS) and the Fire Marshal's Office (FMO).

Emergency Management (EM) continues to update the Emergency Operation Plan. Currently, our office has drafted a "Dam Failure Annex"; we will be exercising this plan during a functional exercise in the spring of 2013. EM has started the application process to make Stanly County a "Storm Ready Community". The Local Emergency Planning Committee continues with quarterly meetings and has an "all hazards approach" to disaster planning.

Emergency Medical Services (EMS) continues to adapt to changing pre-hospital medical practices. A new unit design was placed on an ambulance in November and a remount program was implemented where an existing aluminum body is placed on a new chassis. Annual agility tests are conducted to ensure responders will meet the physical demands of the job. Operational policies are regularly reviewed to respond to increased call volume and reduced response times, fuel usage, maintenance costs and unit utilization.

The Fire Marshal's Office completed 547 fire inspections and responded to 106 fire investigations/calls for service. Fire and life safety education continues to be an important function of this office and several training sessions were conducted throughout the county. One special program was offered called; "Remembering When: A Fire and Fall Prevention Program for Older Adults". This program resulted in two documented lives saved. After completing this program, two participants suffered a fire in their home but due to lessons learned from the program, they were able to extinguish the fire and evacuate the home prior to the fire department's arrival.

TRANSPORTATION

Airport

- Completed the resurfacing of runways, the parallel taxiway and connecting taxiways. This \$6,000,000 project was funded by grants from the Federal Aviation Administration and the Department of Defense through the North Carolina Air National Guard at no expense to Stanly County.
- The Airport is now home to "Team AeroDynamix," the world's largest formation aerobatic team which performs at many of the nation's largest airshows, including "Sun 'n Fun" in Lakeland, Florida and the largest "EAA AirVenture" in Oshkosh, Wisconsin. Team AeroDynamix trains at the airport throughout the year, and hosted a "Formation Flying" clinic in the new Air Terminal where approximately 50 pilots and aircraft from around the United States stayed in local hotels during an extended weekend clinic.
- Pressley Aviation is now conducting flying school in the old terminal building and offers lessons for Sport Pilot through multi-engine, Instrument and Commercial Pilot ratings. Their goal is to eventually offer a Federal Aviation Administration, Part 141 School and testing center at the Stanly County Airport. The Part 141 School enables them to offer flight training to veterans under the "Post 911 G.I. Bill."




